#### Historic Train Station May Become Senior Citizen Center

A historic train station that has stood vacant in Glen Ridge for the past five years may soon become a senior citizens center and mini-museum.

Although NJ Transit will not sell its Ridgewood Avenue station to Glen Ridge, officials are negotiating a long-term lease on the property.

"It's vacant property right smack in the middle of town, and nothing is being done with it, so we thought we should take it over and do something," said Glen Ridge Councilman Frank Schulte in a recent Star Ledger article.

The stone station was built in 1887 to replace a smaller structure, said Schulte, who has trying for years to create a senior citizens center.

he said the developer, A.G. Darwin of Glen Ridge, deeded the station to the railroad in the 1920s, with the stipulation that all passenger trains would stop in town. Darwin thought train service would aid Glen Ridge's development, Shulte added.

The center would contain not only meeting rooms, but also an area for paintings of past mayors and other historic artifacts, Schulte said. he said doctors and other professionals would be invited to speak on health care and other issues affecting older people.

### Lambert Castle Being Restored With help Of Supporters

Most of the estimated \$5 million needed for the restoration of the Lambert Castle in Paterson, once home to a Paterson silk mill baron, has been raised.

members of a non-profit group seeking to raise the remainder are asking interested donors to become part of the organization—
The lambert castle Trust—for a \$20 membership.

"This has been an important part of the social history of Passaic County," Freeholder Norman Robertson said during a press tour of the castle to announce the trust's formation. "We all have a stake in supporting the preservation of this treasure."

Pointing to a three-story interior atrium that has been partially restored to reveal a skylight, he added, "It's going tobe breathtaking when you walk in."

#### Did You Know...

In the 1940's, Bloomfield was known as the horseradish capital of the United States. Newspaper accounts from the period said that the farms, which no longer exist, produced about 5,000 bushels a year. The largest market was New York City during passover, when horseradish is used in the Seder as the "bitter herb" to remind Jews of their slavery in Egypt. The farms were later replaced by development.

lion from the Passaic County freeholder board. \$1.1 million from the NJ Historic Trust, \$870,000 from a state Department of Transportation fund for historic preservation, and \$1 million in Green Acres funding for work on the park adjacent to the castle.

Built by local silk baron Catholina Lambert on a 15-acre parcel on Garret Mountain in 1892, the majestic brownstone and granite structure Lambert called belle Vista provided him with a "beautiful view" of Paterson and its silk mills.

Organizers of the project want the restoration of the castle to provide future generations with the same sort of view into the past.

## Canal Society Of New Jersey Proposes Historic Markers For Bloomfield.

In a recent letter to Mayor Norton, The Canal Society Of New Jersey expressed interest in continuing the program to install historic markers along the Morris Canal route through New Jersey.

The Society recently completed the installation of of these markers at over 50 locations.

Bloomfield would be the first Essex County community to receive these markers. In addition to the remaining rights of way there exists in Bloomfield, signs would be erected behind Lindbergh Boulevard and just west of the Parkway at Watchung Avenue. Also John F. Kennedy Drive rises to Hoover Ave on one of the 23 famous inclined planes that carried boats up the higher hills between canal levels.

Thursday, Sept 12 At The Oakeside Bloomfield Cultural Center




The Historical Society Of Bloomfield will present on Thursday, September 12 at The Oakeside Cultural Center "Thomas Edison And The Bloomfield Connection," a lecture and slide presentation by George Tselos, archivist at the Edison National Historic Site in West Orange.

In his lifetime, Thomas Edison was awarded 1,093 patents. His first was in 1869 for his electric vote recorder, when he was 22. He was still experimenting with rubber from goldenrod when he died at 84.

The inventions ranged from subtle refinements of existing technology to major new concepts, such as the phonograph, which profoundly altered our culture. Though not a theoretical scientist, as he was the first to admit—even proudly—Edison contributed more to technological progress in America than any other person, and in some area added significantly to the store of purely scientific knowledge. He helped lead America from the age of steam into the age of electricity.

Edison had factories and warehouses in Bloomfield. Mr. Tselos will talk about about Edison, the man, and also his ties to Bloomfield and the surrounding towns.

This will be the first program of the Historical Society in conjunction with the Oakeside Bloomfield Cultural Center which is located at 240 Belleville Ave., Bloomfield. The meeting is free and will begin at 8p.m. Please come and bring a friend.

# The New Jersey Historical Society Wants Your Poodle Skirt

The New Jersey Historical Society is asking for donations of your childhood. It could be your old lunchbox, high school photos or anything related to being a teenager in New Jersey.

"Teenage New Jersey: From Frank Sinatra To Bruce Springsteen," is an expansive show that will celebrate the society's new digs when it opens in June of 1997.

Whether you saved poodle skirts or bellbottoms, bobby socks or platform shoes, dance cards or disco jackets, the historical society wants them. They need this kind of everyday stuff in order to explore New Jersey's Teen life from the '40s to the mid-'70s.

"Part of the problem is conveying to people that we think the old stuff is important," says curator Ellen Snyder in the *Star Ledger*. "We get the response "You wouldn't want this or that."

But they do. This exhibit is a broad-based collecting project, arguably the largest ever undertaken by the historical society, that is meant to build on its collection of 20th Century holdings.

Its teen theme is meant to catch attention, since many people have memories—and items that illustrate those memories—from their high school years.

On the societys wish list are: items pertaining to school, including yearbooks, class rings, sports uniforms, report cards and textbooks; leisure-time items like beach badges, amusement park souvenirs, and car-related memorabilia. They also seek clothing, music and church items as well as things representing the politics of the time—including buttons, letters from World War II GIs, anti-Vietnam bumper stickers, POW bracelets or campaign materials.
